Suggestions for Success

District 742 schools work with students and families to support student success in reading and math. Some key connections with families include:

- Minnesota Math Corps serves students in small groups.
- C4 prepares students for college and/or career while building skills to be successful in school and beyond. Life Smarts 1.0 focuses on health, healthy decision-making, personal care and wellness, as well as careers in health sciences and human services. Life Smarts 2.0 includes personal finance, careers in business, entrepreneurship, communication and arts.
- Schoology is a learning management system for teachers and students.
- Online textbooks for math, language arts, science and social studies
- District and school website resources support and challenge student learning and are avail- able at www.isd742.org and your school's website.

Reading and math take practice. Here are a few ideas to help with that. Families may have other ideas to add to this list.

- Have fun with math. Use materials found at home to explore math. In addition, use ALEKS to develop math skills, be informed by looking for the Roar weekly newsletter or Teacher web pages regularly.
- Be informed by looking for the class or school newsletter each month and by visiting the school website regularly.
- Read and review with your student, the information that the school and the District provides.
- Help your student manage homework time.
- Attend family fun nights and participate in activities and strategies to promote student learning.
- Try to attend South Parent Association or South Somali Parent Group meetings, or get information from the ROAR weekly newsletter.

Students may want to try the following ideas to make connections between learning at home and at school:

- Participate in at least one school activity.
- Check Skyward grades on a regular basis.
- Contact counselors, administrators and teachers periodically.
- Pursue interests and make friends through extracurricular activities.
- Omplete assignments every day and ask for help as needed.
- Read at least 30 minutes every day outside of school.
- Give all notices from the school to a parent or guardian.
