


# What is College Knowledge Month?

# Preparing for college

- Tips on preparing for college
  - Take notes and learn good study habits
  - Listen and ask questions
  - Take rigorous classes that will prepare you for college level classes
  - Learn what you want in a college/university
  - Complete interest inventories to give ideas of where your interests are for possible careers
  - Research and tour colleges
  - Learn more about the differences between degrees, majors, certificates pathways
  - Prep/take any college level exams required by specific institutions

## Preparing for college continued

- Things to do your <u>SENIOR</u> year:
  - August: save money for college, decide top college choices, request for admissions information
  - <u>September</u>: mark your calendar with deadlines for registration, admissions, and financial aid, look at virtual tours of colleges, register for ACT/SAT(see note below) if you haven't taken them, set up FAFSA
  - October: Take ACT/SAT (see note below), finish FAFSA, attend college planning nights, College Knowledge Month
  - <u>November</u>: complete applications by their deadlines, if you haven't already done so: attend college planning nights, complete FAFSA, review you Student Aid Report (SAR), and complete for every scholarship you are eligible for
  - <u>December</u>: research deadlines at the college you plan to attend, such as housing, and school specific financial aid applications and deadlines, keep watch on scholarships

# Preparing for College continued

- January: keep watching scholarships and get an early start on completing them, don't let your grades slide towards the end of the school year
- February: be mindful of deadlines
- March: be on the lookout for school acceptance letters, look for summer jobs
- April: notify schools that you choose not to attend, plan for registration, orientation, and housing
- May: finalize summer job plans, prepare a realistic student budget, follow up with counselors to ensure they foreword your final transcripts to the college
- June: plan for college transportation, attend or register for orientation, work with parents/ guardians on things that you need to know how to do while at college
- July: save money, register for fall semester

- After high school....there are many paths you can choose for higher education. The 2 main options would be to enroll in:
  - Technical/Community College (Certificate, AA): 1-2 Years
  - College/University (Bachelor's degree or Masters/beyond) 4 years+

### Steps for Filling out a FAFSA

### Before Starting A FAFSA

#### Get organized.

- Determine your dependency status...
- FAFSA on the web worksheet.
- Search for school codes.
- Students and parents apply for a PIN.
- Check application deadline dates.

#### Filling Out A FAFSA

#### Fill out the application.

- Fill out your FAFSA.
- Open your saved FAFSA or correction application.
- Sign electronically with your PIN.

#### FAFSA Follow-Up

#### View your results online.

- Check status of a submitted FAFSA or print signature page.
- Make corrections to a processed FAFSA.
- Add or delete a school code.
- View and print your student aid report.
