Supporting Student Achievement

Title I is a federally funded program that began in 1965 to help ensure that all children have the opportunity to reach proficiency on challenging state academic standards and assessments. As the largest federal program supporting education, Title I provides funding that may be used to provide additional instructional staff, professional development, extended time programs and other strategies for raising student achievement in high poverty (target) schools.

Providing Certified Teachers

Certified teachers provide Title I instructional support by typically working with students in small groups in reading and/or math outside of the classroom.

These teachers collaborate closely with the classroom teachers to plan lessons that will reinforce the learning that is taking place in the classroom. Title I teachers use a variety of materials and strategies to help each student gain mastery in areas of difficulty.

- Title I students do not miss any regular reading and/or math instruction from the classroom.
- The extra help is in addition to, not in place of, the regular curriculum instruction.
- Students receive Title I services at times other than during their direct reading and/or math instructional time.
